MEDITATION OF THE DAY

Advent Anticipation

As we come from the glory of the solemnity of Christ the King and enter through a very low door, under a very humble lintel, into Advent, we recognize with wonder that it is the same King who is coming in very lowly form....

In the Gospel about the final days, Saint Luke says men will die of fright in anticipation of what is coming. We want to stop right there and ask, "Why would we die of anticipation, since we know where this path ends?" Before the revelation of the New Testament, they didn't know. But we do know. A childhood memory comes to my mind as I say that. My mother had this little idiosyncrasy of always wanting to see how the book ended. When she began to read, she would always read the end, and then she would diligently go back to the beginning and read the book through. It used to amuse me as a child, and I started to do the same thing because you always like to do what your mother does. We want to see how it is going to turn out. And we do know. We know what is at the end of the path. And so, if we die of anticipation, we should be dying of joy.

When we are not anticipating rightly because we are not going firmly forward on the path, is it not because we are anticipating lesser things?...

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Do we waste our energy sometimes on anticipating how it is going to turn out? We think: things are going to get worse and worse, and I don't think I can do this, and I don't think I can make that much effort, and maybe it won't come out right anyway, and I'd better not do it at all because maybe I can't....

Even in the things that cause us the most suffering, God always has in mind something wonderful for which we need to be purified by suffering. And so we know where the path ends. Just today we had a message from a community in Texas where one of the elderly sisters died at the age of ninety-five, very bright, very clear. As she was being taken by ambulance to the hospital she said three different times, "Oh, Jesus, I'm so eager to see you." This is real anticipation. This is someone who had really been walking on the path and knew what was at the end. — MOTHER MARY FRANCIS OF OUR LADY, P.C.C.

December is traditionally dedicated to the Immaculate Conception. The Blessed Virgin
Mary, in the first moment of her conception, by a
singular privilege of Almighty God, and in view
of the merits of Jesus Christ, our Savior and hers,
was preserved from all stain of original sin.
This age-old belief of the Church was defined by
Pope Pius IX in 1854 as an article of revealed
truth:

Mary was in need of redemption and she was indeed redeemed by the Precious Blood of Jesus Christ. The manner of Mary's redemption, however, was unique. Instead of being freed from original sin after having contracted it, she was preserved from contracting it. This was a most fitting favor for the Mother of the Redeemer.

PRAYER TO THE VIRGIN IMMACULATE

INVOCATION O Mary, conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee.

O Virgin Immaculate, Mother of God and my Mother, from thy sublime height turn upon me thine eyes of pity. Filled with confidence in thy goodness and knowing full well thy power, I beseech thee to extend to. me thine assistance in the journey of life, which is so full of dangers for my soul. And in order that I may never be the slave of the devil through sin, , but may ever live with my heart humble and pure, I entrust myself wholly to thee. I consecrate my heart to thee for ever, my only desire being to love thy divine Son Jesus. Mary, none of thy devout servants has ever perished; may I too be saved. Amen.


