



MEDITATION OF THE DAY

She Who Understands Our Hearts



One of Our Lady's most beautiful titles is
Consoler of the Afflicted, or Comforter of the
Afflicted. We can reach out to ask her help in our
most aching needs and on behalf of our loved ones
who are suffering.... We do not enter deeply enough
into the meaning of "consoler" and into the
meaning of "affliction." Affliction pertains to an
abiding state.... We do not say a person is afflicted
with a headache or with a toothache. We use the
term "affliction" for an infirmity that will always
be there, that cannot be cured or stopped....

Similarly, on the spiritual level we have the affliction of our fallen nature. We have high resolves, but we tend often enough not to act according to those high resolves. We are afflicted with an abiding weakness. We are all afflicted with the results of original sin, and we are afflicted with the results of our own repeated failings and bad behavior. Everyone has some sort of affliction—a weakness, a tendency that to some extent will always be there. A person may have an extreme sensitivity to pain, whether physical, psychological, or spiritual, that is always going to be there. A person may be by nature very irascible, and although this can and must be reduced, the tendency will always be there. It is an affliction of the temperament. Matching that abiding state of affliction is the consoler who is always there, and is not dependent in her service upon the results but is a sustaining presence in the prolonged weakness of the other....

This is most wonderful, that we are encouraged to call the Mother of God the Consolatrix afflictorum.... It is not to condone weakness, not at all. Our Lady never does this, but Our Lady understands.... She enters into it, bears it with the person, sustains it with the person. This is her office, so closely linked to that of the Holy Spirit, the Consolator optime, the best Consoler of all. One could say that she is right there after the Holy Spirit. I find this so beautiful, that they work together: the Spirit of God, the Consolator optime, and Our Lady, Consolatrix afflictorum. —MOTHER MARY FRANCIS OF OUR LADY, P.C.C.

century almost simultaneously in Canada & France: the Association of the Holy Family, founded in Montreal in 1663; The Daughters of the Holy Family in Paris in 1674. In 1893 Pope Leo XIII expressed his approval of a feast and composed part of the Office.

Succeeding Pontiffs welcomed the

feast as an efficacious means to present the Holy Family at Nazareth as the example and true spirit of family life.

In the words of His Holiness Pope Leo XIII, "Nothing truly can be more salutary or efficacious for Christian families to meditate upon than the example of this Holy Family, which embraces the perfection and completeness of all domestic virtues."
