MEDITATION OF THE DAY

How to Understand Jesus and His Heavenly Father



[When engaging in] interior prayer, we can take as the subject of our meditation, one of the mysteries of our holy religion, especially the mysteries of our Lord. By the mysteries of our Lord we mean the principal actions that the Son of God made man accomplished for our salvation, such as his Incarnation, his Nativity, his Circumcision, and his

Passion and Death. We can also meditate on one of the mysteries of the Most Blessed Virgin, such as her Immaculate Conception, her - nativity, and the like.

We begin by filling ourselves with the spirit of the mystery by considering either what the Gospel says about it or what the Church teaches on the subject.... We must join to this an interior desire to profit from it and to receive the spirit, the grace, and the benefits that our Lord wishes us to draw from it. Jesus Christ accomplished these divine mysteries of our holy religion not only to redeem us but also to instruct and to lead us by his example to practice the most profound and sanctifying virtues that he practiced....

Each mystery has its own unique spirit because our Lord practiced certain evident virtues in it that we can observe with particular admiration and astonishment when we pay serious, profound attention to the mystery. Our Lord practiced these virtues to give us an example and to lead us to practice them in imitation of him, aided by the grace he merited for us that accompanies the mystery as a component of its spirit and its reality. For example, the spirit of the mystery of the Incarnation is charity. It is by charity and by love for the human race, as our Lord says, that the eternal Father gave his only Son (Jn 3:16), that the Son became incarnate, and that the Holy Spirit accomplished this mystery. The spirit of the Incarnation is also humility, for as St. Paul says, the Son of God emptied himself, taking the form of a slave (Phil 2:7). The spirit of the mystery of our Lord's Nativity is the spirit of childhood. When the Son of God came into this world, as we read in St. John's gospel, to those who did accept him, he gave power to become children of God (Jn 1:12). This spirit of childhood consists of simplicity, docility, purity, and contempt for worldly riches and grandeur. –SAINT JOHN BAPTIST DE LA SALLE



4PASOS PARA LA ADORACIÓN EUCARÍSTICA







Welcome to April! This month is traditionally devoted to Jesus in the sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. The Catholic Church teaches that the Blessed

Sacrament is the real and living presence of Christ –His Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity– received into our souls with every reception of Holy Communion. Our Eucharistic Lord is the source and summit of our Christian life, the

ultimate proof of His infinite love for us. This month we can deepen our devotion to the Eucharist by attending Eucharistic Adoration (to deepen our relationship with Christ & express our love and gratitude for His sacrifice.) and by participating in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass (which commemorates the Last Supper & Christ's sacrifice on the cross.). During this special month consider signing up for time (30 mins? 1 hr?) in perpetual adoration. The sign-up book is on the table in the Narthex.

Seven Personal Reflections for April

- 1. How do I thank the Lord for His sacrifice on the cross?
- 2. What does it mean to me to receive the Eucharist reverently?
- 3. How do I feel God's love in adoration?
- 4. What helps me to focus during Mass & Eucharistic Adoration?
- 5. How do I share with others the love of Christ thru the Blessed Sacrament?
- 6. Do I let the Holy Spirit work in my life?
- 7. How do I follow the Holy Spirit's prompting in my daily life?

PRAYER OF ADORATION

I adore Thee, O Jesus, true God and true Man, here present in the Holy Eucharist, humbly kneeling before Thee and united in spirit with all the faithful on earth and all the blessed in heaven. In deepest gratitude for so great a blessing, I love Thee, my Jesus, with my whole heart, for Thou art all perfect and all worthy of love.

About Sunday's Insert: INTRO to THEME 2 of THE JUBILEE YEAR 2025 PILGRIMS OF HOPE

- To Be Living Stones in God's Temple

As Pilgrims of Hope, we believe: together, we will be living stones in God's temple. "Like living stones, let yourself be built into a spiritual house." (1 Peter 2:5) The Lord compared Himself to the stone which the builders rejected, but which was made into the cornerstone - and upon this cornerstone the Church is built. (Lumen Gentium, no. 6) In Lumen Gentium, we are

reminded that "the disciples of Christ, persevering in prayer & praising God, should present themselves as a living sacrifice, holy & pleasing to God". We must "bear witness to Christ and give an answer to those who seek an account of that hope of eternal life which is in them". (Lumen Gentium, no. 10) The spiritual house of God is a building designed for His glory, and we, the living stones, glorify the Lord in all we do (1 Cor. 10:31, Lumen Gentium, no 10). The baptized have become "living stones" to be "built

into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood" (1 Pt. 2:9). As living stones, our belief and faithfulness to Christ is strong, firm and not easily moved. To be a "living stone" is to be a "speaker of praise, a declarer of truth and love and light." (1 Cor. 10:31, CCC, no. 1268)

By baptism, we "share in the priesthood of Christ, in his prophetic and royal mission". We must bear witness to Christ and give an answer to those who seek an account of that hope of eternal life that is within them". (Lumen Gentium, no. 10)

The Women of STM Make Presentation to CareNet of ARENET Paradise



A \$1,000.00 check was presented to CareNet of Paradise for the Center to use in its efforts to support women and families seeking alternatives to abortion. This money comes at a critical time when CareNet & other pro-life organizations face strong, *well-funded opposition by groups* including the State of California which has allocated a \$20 million "Abortion Practical Support Fund," to

help cover costs like travel, lodging, and meals for women seeking abortions in California; this includes women from other states. California's pro-abortion laws conflict with Catholic teaching. In Pope Saint John Paul II's encyclical, Evangelium vitae (1995), no. 72, he wrote, Laws which legitimize the direct killing of innocent human beings through abortion or euthanasia are in complete opposition to the inviolable right to life proper to every individual; they thus deny the equality of everyone before the law.

CareNet provides essential services & support to include pregnancy testing, ultrasound, individual and family counseling and a number of other services. The check was presented on behalf of The Women of STM to Ashley Lundberg-CareNet director of development, by Kathy DeCristofaro-parish pro-life coordinator, Barbara Collins, and Cheryl Barron.
