

MEDITATION OF THE DAY



Trusting in His Word

One observation [about today's Gospel] in particular impressed me, namely, the change in the titles for Christ before & after the miraculous catch of fish. Before it, Peter says to Jesus: "Master," in Greek, epistáta, which means approximately "Teacher" or "Rabbi." He still sees Jesus as the great preacher of Israel, the one

who knows how to teach Scripture and, consequently, can teach life.... And this is why Peter, at his word, does something that by conventional everyday standards, according to his own rational calculation, would be senseless. **He bets on the man who is master** not only of the word but also of reality. Trusting that that man is capable of giving instruction from the fullness of **God's word that applies to our experience**, he takes the step. When he returns, he addresses him no longer as "Master," but rather as Kyrios: Lord! This is the divine title. He has recognized in what happened that not only was he sent by a great teacher of Israel, but that he is now standing in the presence of the power of the living God....

What happens next is not simply what one would normally expect, sheer joy at success—a great catch!—but rather alarm about himself, the realization of his own truth, shrinking back from the greatness of God's mystery and from the sinfulness and misery of his own being. But just as he rediscovered Christ...so too he receives himself back in a new way.

Corresponding to the new title of Christ is the fact that he, too, receives a new name. Simon becomes Peter: the name by which the Lord now calls him, by which he is more than he could be on his own. Because he has abandoned himself and his own calculations and has sailed into God's word, into the Lord's call, therefore he receives himself back and more than he himself is: the whole power of Jesus Christ's calling....

[Throughout life,] are hours of darkness, hours of alarm at oneself... But there is also the dawning of the insight that Christ's power is greater than our helplessness, his mercy is greater than our failure.... And in this consoling certainty, we wish to leave this hour, joyful that we have the privilege of being his servants and that we can thereby do the greatest thing possible: be possessed by eternal salvation, by the kingdom of God.—POPE BENEDICT XVI



¡Bienvenidos a febrero! Este mes está dedicado a la Sagrada Familia de Jesús, María y José, modelo de virtud para todos los hogares cristianos. Esta devoción comenzó en el siglo XVII casi

simultáneamente en Canadá y Francia: la Asociación de la Sagrada Familia, fundada en Montreal en 1663; Las Hijas de la Sagrada Familia en París en 1674. En 1893 el Papa León XIII expresó su aprobación de una fiesta y compuso parte del Oficio.

La vida oculta de la Sagrada Familia

La casa de Nazaret es donde comenzamos a comprender la vida de Jesús, la escuela del Evangelio. Primero, una lección de silencio. Que la estima por el silencio, esa admirable e indispensable condición del espíritu, reavive en nosotros... una lección de vida familiar. Que Nazaret nos enseñe qué es la vida familiar, su comunión de amor, su belleza austera y sencilla, su carácter sagrado e inviolable... Una lección de trabajo. Nazaret, patria del Hijo del Carpintero, en ti elegiría comprender y proclamar la ley severa y redentora del trabajo humano. Papa Pablo VI en Nazaret, 5 de enero de 1964. Dado que la Sagrada Familia observaba la ley judía en su perfección, podemos deducir con bastante precisión qué oraciones recitaban.

Los Salmos, eran los favoritos. Tres veces al día Jesús, María y José decían la Tephillah, "La Oración", que consta de 18 largas invocaciones y bendiciones. José (y más tarde Jesús cuando alcanzó la edad adulta) estaba obligado a decir el Shemá, una especie de profesión de fe en el único Dios verdadero, dos veces al día.

Sujeto al marco de la puerta de la casa de Nazaret había un tubo de madera que contenía un pergamino enrollado con un pasaje del Libro de Deuteronomio y otro pasaje (11:13-21) que citaba las bendiciones de servir a Dios. Al entrar y salir de la casa, la Sagrada Familia tocaba piadosamente esta Mezuzá, diciendo: "Que Dios guarde mis salidas y entradas desde ahora y para siempre". . . . para mostrar reverencia por la palabra de Dios.

Ésta fue la oración vocal y más o menos formal que Jesús, María y José ofrecieron en su casa de Nazaret. Sin embargo, en sus corazones siempre oraron. Así como el Corazón de Jesús estaba constantemente unido a Su divinidad, así los corazones de María y José estaban tan estrechamente unidos a Dios que cada acción de ellos era una oración.

Welcome to February! This month is dedicated to the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph – the model of virtue for all Christian households. This devotion began in the 17th

century almost simultaneously in Canada & France: the Association of the Holy Family, founded in Montreal in 1663; The Daughters of the Holy Family in Paris in 1674. In 1893 Pope Leo XIII expressed his approval of a feast and composed part of the Office. "Nothing truly can be more salutary or efficacious for

Christian families to meditate upon than the example of this Holy Family, which embraces the perfection and completeness of all domestic virtues." – Pope Leo XIII

The Hidden Life of the Holy Family

The home of Nazareth is where we begin to understand the life of Jesus -the school of the Gospel. First, a lesson of silence. May esteem for silence, that admirable and indispensable condition of mind, revive in us... a lesson on family life. May Nazareth teach us what family life is, its communion of love, its austere and simple beauty, and its sacred and inviolable character...A lesson of work. Nazareth, home of the Carpenter's Son, in you I would choose to understand and proclaim the severe and redeeming law of human work. Pope Paul VI at Nazareth, Jan. 5, 1964 Since the Holy Family observed the Jewish law in its perfection, we can deduce quite accurately what prayers they recited. **The Psalms, were the favorites.** Three times a day Jesus, Mary, & Joseph said the Tephillah, "The Prayer," consisting of 18 long invocations and blessings. Joseph (and later Jesus when He attained to manhood) was obliged to say the Shema, a sort of profession of faith in the one true God, twice daily.

Fastened to the doorpost of the house at Nazareth was a wooden tube containing a rolled parchment inscribed with a passage from the Book of Deuteronomy and another passage (11:13-21) citing the blessings of serving God. On entering and leaving the house the Holy Family would piously touch this Mezuzah, saying, "May God keep my going out and coming in from now on and forevermore." ... to show reverence for the word of God.

Such was the vocal & the more or less formal prayer which Jesus, Mary, and Joseph offered in their home at Nazareth. In their hearts, however, they prayed always. Just as the Heart of Jesus was constantly united with His divinity, so were the hearts of Mary and Joseph so closely bound to God that their every action was a prayer.
