MEDITATION OF THE DAY



The Temptations of Christ Reflecting on the temptations to which Jesus was subjected in the

wilderness invites each of us to answer a fundamental question: <u>What</u> <u>really counts in my life</u>? In the first temptation the devil proposes to Jesus that he turn a stone into bread to appease his hunger. Jesus retorts that man...does not live on bread alone. Without a response to his hunger for

truth, to his hunger for God, man cannot be saved. In the second temptation the devil proposes the way of power to Jesus... Jesus is very clear that it is not worldly power that saves the world, but the power of the cross, of humility and of love. In the third temptation the devil suggests to Jesus that he throw himself down from the pinnacle of the Temple... that is, that he do something sensational to put God himself to the test; but the answer is that God is not an object on which to impose conditions of our own making; he is the Lord of all.

What is the essence of the three temptations to which Jesus is subjected? It is the proposal to exploit God, to use him for one's own interests, for one's own glory and for one's own success. And therefore, essentially to put oneself in God's place, removing him from one's own existence & making him seem superfluous. Each of us must ...ask him or herself: what place does God have in my life? Is he the Lord or am I?...

Today it is no longer possible to be Christian as a mere consequence of living in a society that has Christian roots: even those who are born into a Christian family and receive a religious education must every day renew their decision to be Christian, that is, to give God first place in the face of the temptations that a secularized culture constantly suggests.... It is far from easy to be faithful to Christian marriage, to practice mercy in daily life, to make room for prayer and inner silence.... In this season of Lent let us renew our commitment to make room for God, seeing daily reality with his eyes. **The alternative** between being closed into our own egotism & openness to the love of God and others, we might say, corresponds to the alternative of the temptations of Jesus: an alternative, that is, between human power and love of the cross.... Being converted means not shutting ourselves into the quest for our own success, our own prestige, our own status, but rather ensuring that every day, in the small things, truth, faith in God, and love become the most important thing of all.. –Pope BENEDICT XVI

¡Bienvenidos a marzo! Debido a la

Solemnidad de San José el 19 de marzo, este mes está dedicado a este gran santo, padre adoptivo de Cristo. "Conviene mucho a los cristianos, honrando a la Virgen Madre de Dios, invocar constantemente con profunda piedad y confianza a su castísimo esposo, San José. Tenemos una convicción bien fundada de que tal es el deseo especial de la misma Santísima Virgen". –Papa León XIII

Los 2 atributos restantes de San José que los hombres y las mujeres pueden imitar

En el boletín del domingo pasado compartimos 3 de los cinco atributos de San José que los hombres (y las mujeres) pueden imitar, que son: 1) San José era un hombre justo: los católicos podemos darle a Dios el primer lugar en nuestras vidas, ser personas de oración, leer las Escrituras y santificar cada día con la oración. 2) San José amaba a Jesús y Jesús amaba a José: también podemos amar a Jesús fervientemente entregándole nuestras vidas. 3) San José amaba a María: también debemos tener devoción a María, nuestra madre y nuestra Reina, para amarla, proteger su honor y entregarnos a ella.

A continuación, se presentan los dos últimos de los cinco atributos:

4. (de 5) **San José, también conocido como "el trabajador", abrazó el trabajo.** Trabajó tan duro que el trabajo siempre estará identificado con su nombre. No era un holgazán que dejaba las cosas para más tarde, y no idolatraba la comodidad y la facilidad como nosotros tan a menudo lo hacemos. Trabajó con sus manos para mantener a su esposa y a su hijo, y ninguna tarea era demasiado insignificante para él. Entregó su cuerpo y su alma a sus deberes diarios, y este trabajo era un acto de adoración y oración. Los hombres están llamados a abrazar su trabajo como San José, sin importar cuán mundano sea. Ya sean profesionales de negocios, militares, artesanos, diseñadores gráficos, profesores, escritores, etc., podemos glorificar a Dios con el trabajo de nuestras mentes y cuerpos.

5. (de 5) **San José hizo la voluntad de Dios.** ¿Por qué Dios eligió a San José? De todos los miles de hombres judíos, muchos de los cuales sin duda eran justos, ¿por qué se eligió a un humilde carpintero para ser el padre terrenal del Salvador? La respuesta es simple: Dios sabía que San José haría cualquier cosa que se le pidiera, sin importar lo difícil que fuera.

Los santos están de acuerdo en que la conformidad con la voluntad de Dios a través de la obediencia inmediata es uno de los caminos más seguros hacia la santidad. San José ejemplificó esta virtud, y un ejemplo perfecto es la huida a Egipto. El ángel del Señor se le apareció a San José en un sueño, advirtiéndole del peligro que se avecinaba. Luego, las Escrituras nos dicen que "cuando se levantó, tomó al Niño y a su madre de noche y partió hacia Egipto". ¿Entendiste eso? En el momento en que se despertó, obedeció. No dejó que el miedo a la incertidumbre lo paralizara, no pasó semanas planeando y no ahorró algo de dinero primero. Tomó a Jesús y a María y partió hacia Egipto, confiando su familia a la providencia de Dios. Eso es obediencia pronta, y por eso a San José le fue confiada la mayor responsabilidad jamás dada a un hombre.

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Welcome to March! Due to the Solemnity of St. Joseph on March 19, this month is devoted to this great saint, the foster father of Christ. "It greatly behooves Christians, while honoring the Virgin Mother of God, constantly to invoke with deep piety and confidence her most chaste spouse, St. Joseph. We have a well grounded conviction that such is the special desire of the Blessed Virgin herself." –Pope Leo XIII

The Remaining 2 Attributes of St. Joseph Men & Women Can Imitate

In last Sunday's bulletin we shared 3 of St. Joseph's five attributes that men (and women) can imitate which were: 1) St. Joseph was a righteous man: we Catholics can give God first place in our lives by being people of prayer, reading Scripture & sanctifying each day with prayer. 2) St. Joseph loved Jesus & Jesus loved Joseph: we, too, can love Jesus fervently by giving our lives to Jesus. 3) St. Joseph loved Mary: we too should have a devotion to Mary - our mother & our Queen - to love her, protect her honor, and give ourselves to her.

Below are the last two of the five attributes:

4. (of 5) **St. Joseph - also known as "the worker" embraced work**. He worked so hard that work is forever identified with his name. He wasn't a lazy procrastinator, and he didn't idolize comfort and ease as we so often do. He labored with his hands to provide for his wife & Son, and no task was too insignificant for him. He poured his body and soul into his daily duties, and this work was an act of worship and prayer. Men are called to embrace their work like St. Joseph, no matter how mundane it may be. Whether business professionals, military, craftsman, graphic designers, professors, writers, etc., we can glorify God with the labor of our minds & bodies.

5. (of 5) St. Joseph did the will of God. Why did God choose St. Joseph? Of all the thousands of Jewish men, many of whom no doubt were righteous, why was a humble carpenter chosen to be the earthly father of the Savior? The answer is simple: God knew St. Joseph would do anything asked of him, no matter how difficult.

The saints agree that conformity to the will of God thru prompt obedience is one of the surest paths to holiness. St. Joseph exemplified this virtue, and a perfect example is the flight into Egypt. The angel of the Lord appeared to St. Joseph in a dream, warning him of the coming danger. Scripture then tells us that, "When he arose, he took the young Child and His mother by night & departed for Egypt." Did you catch that? The minute he woke up, he obeyed. He didn't let fear of uncertainty paralyze him, he didn't spend weeks planning, and didn't save up some money first. He took Jesus & Mary and left for Egypt, entrusting his family to the providence of God. That is prompt obedience, and that is why St. Joseph was entrusted with the greatest responsibility ever given to a man.
