MEDITATION OF THE DAY

United in Love



We who form the Church on earth can and must pray for each other: for those we love, for those who love us, for those who hate us, for the world at large, for our brothers and sisters in Christ and for his enemies. The community to which we Christians belong extends across time as well as space, embracing the departed alongside the living. No one is saved alone.

We are saved in and through others; and since for us Christians death does not constitute an impassable barrier or wall of separation, we look for help and companionship not only to the living but to those who have already completed their earthly course. In the unity of the Church, they and we are still organically linked together.

In heaven, I will not serve in the same way as I serve here but I will serve in another way. I want to serve all my life and in eternity—different gradations, but the same thing. In heaven we might not send roses, like the Little Flower does, but we will be at the beck and call of everyone on earth who calls on us. Icons and images of saints remind us that they are there; we are to call on saints so they will serve us....

The Church is on a pilgrimage toward the Father—a huge horde of people walking toward the heavenly Jerusalem—a pilgrimage led by the saints and Our Lady. Implore their help because they are guides to knowing God; and if you know God you will give him to others.

Noviembre convoca desde la Iglesia un tiempo de oración por las almas del purgatorio. Sin embargo, muchos católicos se han olvidado de orar por los muertos a diario simplemente porque ya no van a misa semanal ni practican este aspecto de su fe,

incluso si ocasionalmente celebran misas por sus seres queridos fallecidos. En 1998, la Iglesia celebró el mil aniversario de la introducción del Día de los Difuntos por parte de San Odillo, el entonces abad de Cluny en Francia. Pero ni siquiera fue mencionado por la prensa católica estadounidense ni se reunieron artículos académicos o simposios para discutir las cuestiones relacionadas con el significado del dogma relativo al purgatorio.

Orientación de Santo Tomás

Santo Tomás especula que los que están en el purgatorio son más perfectos que nosotros en cuanto a que no pueden pecar, pero son menos perfectos que nosotros en cuanto al castigo que sufren. En este último sentido, ellos no están en un estado de oración por nosotros, sino más bien en un estado que requiere que oremos por ellos. Pero nada les impide alabar, agradecer, adorar, pedir y cosas por el estilo, pero Tomás no desarrolla esta noción de su vida de oración.

Dado que la Iglesia desde el principio siempre ha enseñado que es bueno y útil orar por nuestros seres queridos fallecidos, parece que [nuestros esfuerzos] pueden hacer varias cosas por ellos:

- 1. Nuestras oraciones y sacrificios pueden traerles consuelos desconocidos en medio de sus sufrimientos, pero no sabemos por revelación divina exactamente qué sucede.
- 2. Nuestros esfuerzos en su nombre pueden en realidad liberarlos de su estado directamente al cielo, ya sea porque la purificación posiblemente "se aceleró" o quizás se prescindieron de algunas purificaciones que tienen que ver con algo como restaurar la gloria extrínseca de Dios que les fue quitada indebidamente por pecado personal.

Cualquiera que sea el caso, la Iglesia enseña la importancia de la oración personal por los difuntos como signo de unidad con ellos y de amor divino hacia ellos en sus necesidades.

November calls forth from the Church a time of prayer for the souls of purgatory. However, many Catholics have forgotten to pray for the dead on a daily basis simply because they neither go to

weekly Mass anymore nor practice this aspect of their faith, even if they occasionally have Masses celebrated for their deceased loved ones. In 1998, the Church celebrated the One Thousandth Anniversary of the introduction of All Souls Day by St. Odillo, the then Abbot of Cluny in France. But, it was not even mentioned by the American Catholic Press nor were there scholarly articles or symposia gathered to discuss the issues around the meaning of the dogma concerning purgatory.

Guidance From St. Thomas

St. Thomas speculates that those who are in purgatory are more perfect than we insofar as they are not able to sin, but they are less perfect than we insofar as the punishment which they are suffering is concerned. In this latter respect, they are not in a state of prayer for us, but rather in a state which requires us to pray for them. But nothing stops them from praising, thanking, adoring, petitioning and the like but Thomas does not develop this notion of their prayer life.

Since the Church from the beginning has always taught that it is good and helpful to pray for our deceased loved ones, it seems that [our efforts] may do several things for them:

- 1. Our prayers and sacrifices may bring unknown consolations to them in the midst of their sufferings but we do not know from divine revelation exactly what happens.
- 2. Our efforts on their behalf may actually release them from their state directly into heaven either because the purification is possibly "hurried along" or perhaps some purifications were dispensed with that bear on something such as restoring the extrinsic glory of God which was unduly taken away by personal sin.

Whatever the case may be, the Church teaches the importance of personal prayers for the dead as a sign of unity with them and divine love for them in their needs.
