

MEDITATION OF THE DAY  
Behold the Lamb

**How suddenly the Christmastide interval comes to an end!** For nearly three weeks we have been playing truant from the grim school of life, among sights and sounds that brought back our childhood; the mystery of a cave, and the warm smell of a stable.

**And then the Epiphany octave has for its tailpiece the gaunt figure of St. John,** pointing to the Man he has baptized and saying: "Look, this is the Lamb of God!"

**Just as we are wrapping away the last sheep from the Crib...** [we are] reminded that the lamb's role is to be a victim! That is what the Baptist will have meant; to the Jewish mind, the lamb was not particularly a type of innocence. The last present the Wise Men brought was, after all, the wisest; Simeon was right—this Child was to be a sign men would refuse to recognize. The shadow of the Passion has fallen over our rejoicings.

**Yes, it is like Saturday night in the schoolroom; our toys must be put away.**

At all times there have been Christians who were so far betrayed into error by temperament or by false logic, as to think that nature was utterly tainted by the Fall, that God's gifts were only snares, that we must refuse all comfort, fight shy of all mirth, shake our heads over all enjoyment. Against that wet-blanket doctrine, Christmas is a salutary protest; God suckled by a Mother's milk, among friendly creatures, recognized by simple hearts—yes, Bethlehem is the antidote. But Bethlehem—heaven finding a home on earth—is not all. Jordan, too, has its place in the Christian philosophy; baptismal Jordan, the type of death, and separation, and penance for wrong done. God's gifts are not simply his birthday presents; they are the stepping-stones of mortification as well.

By all means let us wish one another—ourselves even—a comfortable new year. But we might steel ourselves with the resolution not to demand comfort as a right or cling to it...—MONSIGNOR RONALD A. KNOX



## DEEPENING DEVOTION TO THE HOLY NAME OF JESUS

¿No es maravilloso que nuestra Iglesia nos brinde un día y un mes especiales para meditar sobre el misterio de la acción salvadora de Dios en nuestras vidas a través de su Hijo? En honor al Santo Nombre de Jesús, te invitamos a profundizar tu devoción a su Nombre a través de la oración y el canto.

A continuación, encontrará cuatro sugerencias para la devoción al Santo Nombre de Jesús. ¡Que su amor por Jesús se profundice al aferrarse a Su Santo Nombre!

### 1. Medita en el Nombre de Jesús.

Junto con la Oración de Jesús, la Letanía del Santísimo Nombre de Jesús es una poderosa manera de meditar en el Nombre de Jesús.

### 2. Canta alabanzas y medita en el nombre de Jesús.

Algunas canciones para alabar y meditar en Su nombre son: «Santo Dios, alabamos tu nombre», «¡Salve, oh poder del nombre de Jesús!» y «Ante el nombre de Jesús».

### 3. Recen la Oración de Jesús como una poderosa forma de meditar en el Nombre de Jesús.

Para tener siempre Su Nombre en sus labios, consideren adoptar una oración popular entre los católicos orientales y nuestros hermanos y hermanas ortodoxos: la Oración de Jesús. A menudo se reza con un rosario llamado chotki, pero también se puede rezar con un rosario común. La oración es sencilla: en cada cuenta o nudo se reza: «Señor Jesucristo, Hijo de Dios, ten misericordia de mí, pecador».

### 4. Recen la Letanía del Santísimo Nombre de Jesús, otra poderosa manera, tanto para familias como para personas individuales, de meditar en el Nombre de Jesús.

This is a time when the Church honors the Holy Name of Jesus, an observance deeply rooted in the faith's history & theology. The Catholic Church has celebrated the Feast of the Holy Name of Jesus since the 15th century.**

## DEEPENING DEVOTION TO THE HOLY NAME OF JESUS

*Isn't it beautiful that our Church gives us a special day and month to meditate on the mystery of God's saving action in our lives through His Son? In honor of the Holy Name of Jesus, consider deepening your devotion to His Name through prayer and song.*

*Listed below are four suggestions for devotion to the Holy Name of Jesus. May your love for Jesus deepen as you cling to His Holy Name!*

### 1. Meditate on Jesus' Name.

*Along with the Jesus Prayer, the Litany of the Most Holy Name of Jesus is a powerful way to meditate on Jesus' Name.*

### 2. Sing in praise & meditation on Jesus' Name.

*A few songs to use for praise and meditation on His Name include "Holy God, We Praise Thy Name", "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name", and "At the Name of Jesus".*

### 3. Pray the Jesus Prayer as a powerful way to meditate on Jesus' Name.

*To keep His Name always on your lips, consider adopting a prayer popular among Eastern Catholics and our Orthodox brothers and sisters: the Jesus Prayer. Often prayed on a prayer rope called a chotki, it can also be prayed on regular rosary beads. The prayer is simple: on each bead or knot you pray, "LORD JESUS CHRIST, SON OF GOD, HAVE MERCY ON ME, A SINNER."*

*When this prayer becomes habitual, we become more attuned to praying His Name throughout our days and more aware of our constant need for His mercy and love.*

### 4. Pray The Litany of the Most Holy Name of Jesus, another powerful way, for families and individuals, to meditate on Jesus' Name.

*Note: We will publish the full Litany, along with its benefits to individuals and families who pray the Litany, in next week's edition of the bulletin.*
