#### MEDITATION OF THE DAY

Peace I Leave With You

We must not be slaves of either time or health;

we cannot dispose of either as we will! If we thought of acting only when all the conditions were favorable, we would pass our lives doing nothing; or at least we would get out of life very little of what it can give us.

**Go ahead!** That is a phrase I like so much. Even if everything is far from perfect, we must learn to say it. And things will go ahead, since joy does not come from without or from circumstances. Its principal source is within us. That is why faith is such a sure source of happiness, even now. The faithful who keep themselves in a state of grace, or who see that they return to it without delay whenever necessary, possess in their souls God who is infinite Goodness. And it is his presence that keeps them in peace. Troubles and disturbing events will always cause suffering; it is a law of life & we cannot alter it. We shall never banish suffering in our life, but we can forbid it entrance to our soul, or at any rate to the higher part of the soul. We are there, as it were, on a mountain, and we regard our troubles as the dweller upon the mountain contemplates the storm sweeping over the plain. But we do not reach that height all at once; we have to arrive at it by stages.

**The thousand and one petty annoyances** that each day brings are our training. We must calmly watch them come and go. To want to avoid them all is impossible; to allow them to upset us is a weakness. There will always be some cloud on the horizon of our lives. But do not let any of these things stop you, or even affect you. In short: Go ahead! -Dom Augustin Guillerand, O. Cart.

HOMILY NOTES			
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¡Bienvenidos a mayo! Este mes está dedicado a Nuestra Señora, ocasión para un "conmovedor homenaje de fe y amor que los católicos de todo el mundo [rinden] a la Reina del Cielo. Durante este mes, los cristianos, tanto en la iglesia como en privado en el hogar, ofrecen a María desde el corazón un homenaje especialmente ferviente y amoroso de oración y

veneración. También durante este mes, los beneficios de la misericordia de Dios nos llegan desde su trono con mayor abundancia" (Pablo VI: Encíclica sobre el mes de mayo, n.º 1). El padre Chuck, en su correo electrónico del 1 de mayo, recordó a los feligreses de STM la importancia de este mes cuando escribió: "...durante mayo, este mes de Nuestra Señora, María, Madre de Dios... Venerémosla y recemos el rosario como Nuestra Señora de la Paz nos ha instruido a hacer".



Existen diversas definiciones del término "madre". Ya sea una definición tradicional, como la de una mujer que asume un rol espiritual o emocional a través de la amistad, la mentoría o el liderazgo, estas relaciones pueden ser sumamente complejas. La maternidad es a la vez lo más grande y lo más difícil. Es un trabajo desgarrador, ansioso y agotador. La enorme presión de la maternidad puede convertir incluso a las mujeres más encantadoras en madres irritables y enojadas. Quizás lo más desafiante no sea que las madres estén siempre al mando, sino la lucha interna que implica su rol. No podemos comprender la responsabilidad, la vocación y la presión que supone compaginar las responsabilidades que las madres deben asumir. No es un trabajo fácil.

#### María Nuestra Madre

María es a menudo idealizada e incluso idolatrada, y es comprensible, pues fue la madre de Jesús; elegida por Dios para gestar y criar a su hijo. Aunque fue elegida por Dios, seguía siendo humana. Luchó con las mismas dificultades que la mayoría de las madres. María tuvo miedo, hambre, sed y amó. Los padres pueden establecer paralelismos con sus propios roles y encontrar aliento en su historia.

María experimentó dolor y sufrimiento con su hijo. Como madre de Jesús, sufriría el intenso dolor personal de la confusión y la incertidumbre, pero sobre todo el horror de presenciar la tortura, la crucifixión y la muerte de su Hijo. Vemos en las Escrituras que ella estaba "cerca de la cruz de Jesús".

Welcome to May! This month is dedicated to Our Blessed Lady – the occasion for a "moving tribute of faith & love which Catholics in every part of the world [pay] to the Queen of Heaven. During May Christians, both in church & privately in the home, offer up to Mary from their hearts an especially fervent and loving homage of prayer & veneration. Also during this month, the benefits of

God's mercy come down to us from her throne in greater abundance" (Paul VI: Encyclical on the Month of May, no. 1).

Father Chuck, in his May 1st email, reminded STM parishioners of this month's importance when he wrote, "...during May, this month of Our Lady, Mary, Mother of God ...Let's venerate her and pray the rosary as Our Lady of Peace has instructed us to do."

#### Motherhood

There are various definitions of the term "mother." Whether a traditional definition or a woman who assumes a spiritual or emotional role thru friendship, mentorship or leadership; either way, these relationships can be highly complex.

Motherhood is simultaneously the greatest & the hardest thing. The job is heart-wrenching, anxiety-producing, backbreaking. The enormous pressures of motherhood can turn even the most delightful women into irritable, angry moms. Perhaps most challenging is not that mothers are always on duty, but the internal struggle that their role requires. We can't comprehend the responsibility, calling, and pressure there is to juggle the hats mothers are required to wear. It's not an easy job.

# **Mary Our Mother**

Mary is often idealized & even idolized, and understandably so, because she was the mother of Jesus; hand-selected by God to carry & raise His son. Although Mary was hand-selected by God, she was still human. She struggled with the same things most mothers experience. Mary feared hungered, thirsted, and loved. Parents can draw parallels to their own roles & find encouragement in her story.

Mary experienced pain & suffering with her son. As Jesus' mother, she would suffer the intense personal pain of confusion and uncertainty, but mostly the horror of watching her Son's torture, crucifixion, and death. We see in Scripture that she was "near the cross of Jesus."

Motherhood carries a lot of joy, but it also has a lot of sorrow. It opens a mother up to pain, experiencing whatever her children experience, whether that's a scraped knee, feelings of heartbreak, or worse, a mother watching her child die. So in the moments of Jesus on the cross, Mary had to let go of her son and trust the Father with Him in that excruciating moment.

Only when we let go, do we learn that God understands our pain and shares, transforms, and comforts us through it. The pain that we give to God always brings resurrection. All parents know that it's not just the physical pain of childbirth but the pain of being unable to fix something that's broken. We're called to let go & trust God to make His way.

It wasn't only Mary who had to let go of her son, but also some kids who worry about their parents. Jesus was concerned about His mother while He hung on the cross. He looked down at John and told him to care for his mother. Scripture tells us that from that day forward, Mary, the mother of Jesus, lived in the house of John, and he took care of her.

At some point in our life we are faced with the option of controlling the impossible predicaments of our life or letting go and trusting the Father with those we love. It can be hard to let go of control. But the good news is when we let go, God always comes, through resurrection, for His children.

No fue solo María quien tuvo que dejar ir a su hijo, sino también algunos niños que se preocupan por sus padres. Jesús se preocupó por su madre mientras colgaba de la cruz. Miró a Juan y le dijo que cuidara de su madre. Las Escrituras nos dicen que desde ese día, María, la madre de Jesús, vivió en casa de Juan, y él la cuidó.

En algún momento de nuestra vida nos enfrentamos a la opción de controlar los dilemas imposibles de nuestra vida o de dejar ir y confiar en el Padre con nuestros seres queridos. Puede ser difícil soltar el control. Pero la buena noticia es que cuando lo dejamos ir, Dios siempre viene, mediante la resurrección, por sus hijos.
