DAILY MASS READINGS

MEDITATION OF THE DAY

How to "Realize the Certainty" of Christ's Teachings



The Church is designed for the people that we are: people of flesh, people of spirit, people of grace. Without prayer we run the risk of seeing the Church merely as a social body and not the Body of Christ...a body whose limbs we are, each with its vital value for the others.

Without prayer we won't know how obedience to its living laws differs from mere discipline. Without prayer it will be difficult for us to see that the Church is Jesus Christ. We will not perceive the kind of commerce that we are invited to take part in within her. To see that as we move from one person to another in our dealings within the Church we are

always Jesus Christ moving from Jesus Christ to Jesus Christ. Without prayer we will not live the Church. We will not live from her as one can live from the discourse at the Last Supper and the Priestly Prayer of Jesus (cf. Jn 14:1–17:26).... Without prayer the Church may give us all the treasures that we ask of her: the life of God through baptism, the blood of Christ through penance, the whole Christ in Communion, the seal of unity in the Blood of all the Masses and their unending sacrifice—all this will be given to us but, without prayer, we will only keep a small part of it. *Without prayer* we can be learned in the teachings of the Church or some particular area of those teachings, we can learn them and remember them but, without prayer, they will not have brought us the fuller life that they were destined to bring....

Without prayer we will see like people who are short-sighted and obey like servants who are paralyzed. Above all, without prayer, the Gospel will be words but we will risk failing to meet the Person who is speaking, the Person who is training us, the Person whom we are following. *—VENERABLE MADELEINE DELBRÊL*

HOMILY NOTES



26 de enero de 2025 III Domingo Ordinario January 26, 2025

Enero está dedicado al Santo Nombre de Jesús, el cual se celebra el 3 de enero, como una forma formal y señalada para darle honor al Nombre de Jesús. "En el

nombre de Jesús se doble toda rodilla de los que

están en el cielo, en la tierra y debajo de la tierra" (Flp 2,10). La veneración del Nombre de Jesús se remonta al siglo XIV. San Bernardino de Siena y sus discípulos difundieron la veneración del Nombre de Jesús en el siglo XV.

Juan, el Bautista, señala a Jesús, el Cordero de Dios que une el tiempo y la eternidad en el Sacrificio Eucarístico, e incluso la oscuridad cada vez menor de enero parece hacer eco de la oración de San Juan: "Él debe crecer y yo menguar".

8 Maneras de honrar el Santo Nombre de Jesús este enero

- 1. Ocúpate de tomar el nombre del Señor en vano.
- Cambia el canal, apaga la televisión o sal del cine cuando escuches el nombre de Dios pronunciado en vano.
- 2. Inclina tu cabeza cuando escuches el nombre de Jesús.
- Adopte la práctica piadosa de inclinar la cabeza cada vez que diga o escuche el nombre de Jesús (tal como nos inclinamos o hacemos una genuflexión ante la Presencia Real en el tabernáculo o hacemos la señal de la cruz al pasar por una Iglesia Católica). Las Escrituras nos dicen: "Al nombre de Jesús se doble toda rodilla en el cielo, en la tierra y debajo de la tierra" (Filipenses 2:10).
- 3. Decora tu mesa.
- Decorar con colores blancos (la primera quincena de enero está representada por el color litúrgico blanco para la pureza); verde (la segunda quincena de enero comienza el tiempo ordinario y el verde representa la esperanza como una semilla que brota) y las letras IHS, puedes hacerlo tú mismo con lápices de colores o marcadores dorados y plateados.
- 4. Celebre el Santo Nombre de Jesús asistiendo a Misa y Adoración Eucarística.
- 5. Escribe su nombre en tu casa ¡literalmente!
- Bendice tu hogar con el "CMB" escrito con tiza sobre la puerta de entrada, que significa Gaspar, Melchor y Baltasar, los nombres tradicionales de los tres reyes, y también es la abreviatura de "Christus mansionem benedicat" (que Cristo bendiga el casa).
- 6. Pide diariamente la intercesión de María y José.
- 7. Agrega una oración especial este mes como una oración al Santo Nombre de Jesús o reza la Oración de la Flecha Dorada en reparación por las blasfemias contra Su Santísimo Nombre.
- 8. Cante una canción de alabanza como el himno católico "En el nombre de Jesús" y/o "Qué hermoso nombre es este" de Hillsong Worship.



January is dedicated to the Holy Name of Jesus, which was celebrated on Jan.

3, as a formal way and appointed time to give honor to The Name of Jesus. "In the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of

those that are in heaven, on earth and under the earth" (Phil 2:10). The veneration of the Name of Jesus dates back to the 14th century. St. Bernardine of Siena and his disciples spread the veneration of the Name of Jesus in the 15th century.

John, the Baptist, points to Jesus, the Lamb of God who unites time and eternity in the Eucharistic Sacrifice, and even January's diminishing darkness seems to echo St. John's prayer: "He must increase and I must decrease."

8 Ways to honor the Holy Name of Jesus this January

- 1. Take a stand against taking the Lord's name in vain.
- Turn the channel, turn off the tv, or walk out of the movie theater when you hear God's name taken in vain.
- 2. Bow your head when you hear the name of Jesus.
- Adopt the pious practice of bowing your head whenever you say or hear the name of Jesus (just as we bow or genuflect before the Real Presence in the tabernacle or make a sign of the cross as we pass a Catholic Church). Scripture tells us: "At the name of Jesus every knee should bend of those in heaven, on earth, and under the earth" (Phil 2:10).
- 3. Decorate your table.
- Decorate in colors of white (1st half of January represented by liturgical color of white for purity); green (2nd half of January begins ordinary time with green representing hope as a sprouting seed) and the letters IHS you can make this yourself with colored pencils, or gold and silver markers.
- 4. Celebrate the Holy Name of Jesus by attending Mass and Eucharistic Adoration.
- 5. Write his name on your house literally!
- Bless your home with the "CMB" written in chalk over your front door, which stands for Caspar, Melchior, & Balthasar, the traditional names of the three kings, and is also the abbreviation of "Christus mansionem benedicat" (may Christ bless the house).
- 6. Daily ask for Mary and Joseph's intercession.
- 7. Add a special prayer this month such as a prayer to the Holy Name of Jesus or pray the Golden Arrow Prayer in reparation for blasphemies against His Most Holy Name.
- 8. Sing a praise song such as the Catholic hymn "At the Name of Jesus" and/or "What a Beautiful Name Is This" by Hillsong Worship.


