MEDITATION OF THE DAY

Waiting for Christ

Each new year, as it passes, brings us the same warnings again and again,



and none perhaps more impressive than those with which it comes to us at this season.... The year is worn out. Spring, summer, autumn, each in turn, have brought their gifts and done their utmost, but they are over, and the end is come.... Thus the soul is cast forward upon the future, and in proportion as its conscience is clear and its perception true does it rejoice solemnly that the night is advanced, the day is at hand, that there are a new heaven and a new earth (Rv 21:1) to come, though the former are failing. Nay, rather, because they are failing, it will soon see the king in his beauty

and behold a land that stretches afar (Is 33:17).

These are feelings for [those] waiting...calmly though earnestly, for the advent of Christ. And such, too, are the feelings with which we now come before him in prayer day by day. The season is chill and dark, and the breath of the morning is damp, but all this befits those who are by profession penitents and mourners, watchers and pilgrims.... True faith does not covet comforts. It only complains when it is forbidden to kneel, when it reclines upon cushions.... Its only hardship is to be hindered, or to be ridiculed, when it would place itself as a sinner before its judge....

One year goes and then another, but the same warnings recur. The frost or rain comes again; the earth is stripped of its brightness; there is nothing to rejoice in. And then, amid this unprofitableness of earth and sky, the well-known words return: the prophet Isaiah is read, the same epistle and Gospel bidding us to awake from sleep and welcome him who comes in the name of the Lord, the same prayers, beseeching him to prepare us for judgment. O blessed are they who obey these warning voices, and look out for him whom they have not seen, because they have loved his appearing (2 Tm 4:8)....

At present, we are in a world of shadows.... Suddenly it will be rent in twain and vanish away, and our Maker will appear. He will look on us, while we look on him. - Saint John Henry Newman

Saint John Henry Newman († 1890) was a convert to the Catholic faith & a preacher of great eloquence. RECORDANDO A NUESTROS SERES **QUERIDOS MUERTOS DURANTE LA** TEMPORADA NAVIDEÑA


Los católicos pueden recordar a sus seres queridos fallecidos durante la Navidad incluyéndolos en rituales como encender

velas conmemorativas o poner un plato extra en la mesa. (Una tradición irlandesa).

Los católicos también rezan por las almas del purgatorio, celebran una misa por sus seres queridos fallecidos y participan en servicios religiosos o eventos en el cementerio diseñados para honrar a los seres queridos. Damos la bienvenida al Adviento y a la alegría del nacimiento de nuestro Señor y Salvador Jesucristo. Sin embargo, para muchos, la Navidad también puede ser un momento estresante, especialmente al afrontar la partida de un ser querido.

10 maneras de honrar a nuestros seres queridos muertos

- 1. Participe en servicios conmemorativos como una "Misa del Recuerdo" o únase a eventos como la iluminación de un "Árbol del Recuerdo" en los cementerios católicos, donde puede encender una vela o colocar un adorno en memoria del difunto.
- 2. Encienda una vela conmemorativa en un lugar especial de su hogar para encenderla en su memoria durante el Adviento, en la mañana de Navidad o en las comidas.
- 3. Añade un adorno especial a tu árbol de Navidad en su memoria.
- 4. Crea una corona de recuerdos con fotos u objetos que te los recuerden.
- 5. Ofrezcan oraciones por las almas del purgatorio. (Las oraciones se publicaron en la edición del 2 de noviembre del Boletín STM y hay copias en el nártex).
- 6. Reza por la liberación de las almas del purgatorio el día de Navidad*, día en que se cree que reciben una liberación especial. (Ver la oración y las notas de oración en la parte superior de la última página). (Nota: En inglés.)
- 7. Honre su memoria a través de actos de servicio a su parroquia.
- 8. Done a su parroquia o organización benéfica que fue importante para ellos.
- 9. Visita su lugar de descanso, deja una corona o decora su urna con luces.
- 10. Regale un regalo simbólico en su memoria a su parroquia.



Remembering Our Beloved Dead During the Christmas Season

Catholics can remember their beloved dead during Christmas by including them in rituals like lighting memorial candles or setting an extra place at the dinner table. (An Irish tradition.) *Catholics also pray for the souls in purgatory,*

have a Mass celebrated for their beloved dead, and participate in church services or cemetery events designed to honor loved ones.

We welcome the Advent Season and await the joy of the birth of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. However, there are those for whom the Christmas season is a stressful time, especially when coping with the passing of loved ones.

Here are 11 ways to honor our beloved dead

- 1. Participate in memorial services such as a "Mass of Remembrance" or join events like the lighting of a "Tree of Remembrance" at Catholic cemeteries, where you can light a candle or place an ornament in memory of the deceased.
- 2. Light a memorial candle in a special place in your home to be lit in their memory during Advent, on Christmas morning or at mealtimes.
- 3. Add a special ornament to your Christmas tree in their memory.
- 4. Create a memory wreath of photos or objects reminding you of them
- 5. Offer prayers for the holy souls in purgatory. (Prayers published in the Nov 2 edition of the STM Bulletin & copies are in the narthex.)
- 6. Pray the release of souls from purgatory prayer on Christmas Day*, a day they are believed to be particularly released. (See top of back page for prayer and prayer notes.)
- 7. Honor their memory through acts of service to your parish.
- 8. Donate to their parish or to a charity that was important to them.
- 9. Visit their resting place, leave wreath or decorate their urn with lights
- 10. Give a symbolic gift in their memory to your parish.

*Notes on the Christmas Day Prayer for Release of Our Beloved Souls From Purgatory

A traditional Christmas Day prayer to ask for the release of souls from purgatory is attributed to St. Gertrude the Great. The prayer is: "Eternal Father, I offer You the most precious blood of Thy Divine Son, Jesus, in union with the Masses said throughout the world today, for all the holy souls in purgatory, for sinners everywhere, for sinners in the universal church, those in my own home and within my family. Amen." Note: This prayer is traditional and can be prayed, but the Church officially cautions against claiming it releases a specific number of souls (per Pope Leo XIII's 1897 decree, Acts of the Holy See 32 p. 24) While it's believed that many souls are released on Christmas day, the Church encourages prayer & charity to help alleviate their suffering.
